MINUTES – MORRO BAY RECREATION AND PARKS COMMISSION

REGULAR MEETING – November 21, 2013

VETERANS MEMORIAL BUILDING – 5:30 P.M.

CALL TO ORDER: Chair Bates called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

ROLL CALL: PRESENT: Chair Bates, Vice-Chair Sidaris, Commissioner Romero, Commissioner Coxwell, Commissioner Croley, Commissioner Swain, Staff Woods, Staff Sweeny, Staff Wilcox and Staff English.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

COMMISSIONER REPORTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Commissioner Coxwell announced that the Morro Bay High School Music Department will be holding their winter concerts at the PAC on December 3rd for the choir concert and on December 4th for the band concert. He also announced that the CIF Wrestling Tournament will be held at the high school January 10-11, 2014. This is the largest and oldest wrestling tournament in California.

Commissioner Swain encouraged everyone to attend the Morro Bay Merchant Street Fair on Sunday, December 1st.

Recreation Supervisor Sweeny thanked the community for their support of the Estero Youth Soccer program. The all-star teams were able to reduce the cost for participating in post-season tournaments from \$135 to \$25 through sponsorships and by hosting a drive-through BBQ. The Estero Youth Basketball season is getting ready to start and additional volunteer coaches are needed.

Staff Woods announced that the Community Holiday Tree Lighting at City Park will take place on Saturday, December 7th at 4:30 p.m. He also announced that the Morro Bay Community Foundation would like to thank those who came out and supported the Morro Bay Sings Elvis event. The Foundation will be hosting "Love Letters", a 2-person play, on February 15, 2014 at the Vet's Hall.

PRESENTATION

Maintenance Superintendent Mike Wilcox gave a Utility Savings Analysis presentation highlighting the energy savings success experienced at the City. The presentation was based on 7 years worth of data.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Chair Bates opened Public Comment.

Trina Dougherty with Morro Bay Friends of the Library announced that they are "inches" away from beginning the remodel project, and only need to raise an additional \$25,000 with construction starting as soon as February 2014. Ms. Dougherty announced that raffle tickets will be available at the Merchants' Street Fair with prizes donated from local merchants and residents. They recently received a \$100,000 donation from the estate of Bertha Schultz. She asked that anyone interested in making a donation or finding out more about the Morro Bay Friends of the Library visit their website at www.MBFOL.org

Marlise Battistella and Kathy Moore of the Central Coast Women for Fisheries Sculpture Committee provided an update on the status of the Fisherman's Family Sculpture by Elizabeth McQueen. The funds for the sculpture have been raised and the sculpture will be ready for installation at the Council approved site in spring 2014. The Sculpture Committee requested that the RPC consider the use of City Park-In-Lieu fees for the preparation of the site. The Committee also displayed a miniature version of the sculpture and provided the RPC with literature about their group.

Kathryn Thomas spoke in support of starting Pickleball in Morro Bay. She stated that Pickleball is the fastest growing sport you never heard of and that at the World Senior Games there were over 500 Pickleball players participating. She also stated that Jack Hodges of Paso Robles is ready and willing to work with our community to get this going by providing free clinics and free consultation of site recommendations, set-up and costs. She recommended that for more information on Pickleball we can go to the US Pickleball Association's website: www.usapa.org

Nancy Johnson representing Morro Bay Beautiful announced that they are holding their annual Christmas Light Contest and that "elves" will be out on December 13th and 14th to determine the best holiday light displays. On December 16th at 5 p.m. members of Morro Bay Beautiful and their friends and families and anyone else wanting to participate, will be on the trolley handing out the awards. She also announced that Carla's Country Kitchen has sponsored this year's prizes. For more information you can call Ms. Johnson at 772-3738.

Chair Bates closed Public Comment.

MOTION: Vice Chair Sidaris moved that the Commission accept Consent Calendar Items A-1 and A-3 for file and pull A-2 and A-4 for further review. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Coxwell and carried. (6-0)

A-2 CITIZEN'S REPORTS AND CORRESPONDENCE

Staff Woods reviewed the correspondence received for the RPC. The first item is correspondence from the Morro Cove Homeowners Association regarding some concerns they have about their Adopt-A-Park agreement with the City for Morro Cove Park. Specifically they want to know if their agreement allows for any tree trimming, which it does not. Staff Woods stated that the City does not allow outside tree trimming. The HOA group is also interested in knowing if the City is satisfied with the work they have been doing at the park. Staff Woods stated that the City is very grateful for all the volunteer hours and efforts put in by this Adopt-A-Park group. The HOA group is also concerned about the lack of vegetation along the bluff and the high number of dogs in the park. There are currently two mutt-mitt dispensers at the park. Staff is looking to address the vegetation in the park and may be planting additional trees and/or shrubs in the park, possibly some of the 50 Monterey Cypress trees that are part of the Morro Bay 50th celebration. In an effort to address the amount of homeless using the park, staff is looking at installing some fencing along the sensitive habitat similar to the fencing found at North Point. The hope is that by protecting the sensitive habitat and bringing in the right plants the monarch butterflies will start returning to Morro Cove.

The other correspondence received is from Kathryn Thomas regarding Pickleball. Staff Woods stated that we are excited about Pickleball and very interested in promoting the sport in Morro Bay. The existing tennis courts at Monte Young and Del Mar can be modified for Pickleball. Another option would be the basketball court at Coleman Park with the idea of striping two Pickleball courts and using portable fencing. Staff Woods also mentioned possible indoor space at the Vets Hall and the Community Center, although there would be very limited times available.

Commissioner Sidaris stated his support of using Coleman Park for Pickleball.

Commissioner Croley asked about using the gym at Del Mar Elementary. She stated that she feels Del Mar Elementary is an under-utilized facility.

Commissioner Swain stated that in Fountain Valley Pickleball is played crossways on tennis courts with specific times set aside for Pickleball.

A-4 RECREATION AND PARKS DEPARTMENT STATUS REPORT

Staff Woods summarized the Department Program/Project Status Report. Staff Woods invited the RPC to contact staff if they are interested in additional information on any items listed in the report.

MOTION: Commissioner Croley moved to accept Consent Calendar Items A-2 and A-4 for file. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Swain and carried. (6-0)

B. PUBLIC HEARINGS

C. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

C-1 REVIEW WORK PROGRAM

Staff Woods presented the Work Program for a mid-year review prior to the January review for the 2014/15 fiscal year. Staff Woods stated that staff is looking for input from the RPC on any projects they want to be included in January's review.

Staff Woods reported that at their regular meeting on October 22, 2013, City Council requested that the RPC review the Work Program with the Northern Waterfront Implementation Plan (NWIP) in mind, and try to accomplish as much of the program as possible with the current balance of Park-In-Lieu fees. The City Council has put the master planning of Coleman Park, Target Rock and the Rock parking lot on hold. Staff Woods stated that no formal motion is needed tonight, just acceptance for file with possible notes of emphasis on any projects that are a priority for the RPC. Staff Woods reviewed which items on the 2013/14 Work Program have been completed or will be completed this fiscal year.

Commissioner Croley asked that the BMX bike park be included in the 2014/15 Work Program as well as the Fisherman's Family Sculpture.

Commissioner Coxwell requested that the Del Mar parking lot and restrooms be a priority in the Work Program.

Chair Bates noted that with the spring 2014 delivery of the Fisherman's Family Sculpture, we should likely adapt the master plan in order to receive the sculpture. Staff Woods responded that the public art proposal for the sculpture has been approved but there is no site specific plan for the area. The sculpture is to be placed in the south-west corner of

the Target Rock area and there are costs associated with adjusting the master plan and getting the area ready. It is staff's recommendation that Park-In-Lieu fees be used towards preparing to receive the sculpture.

Commissioner Croley stated that we need to fix what we have before developing new areas along the waterfront. Commissioner Swain agreed that we need to concentrate on maintenance and replacing restrooms.

Staff Woods noted that it is Council's intent to use the funds for tangible items and they are interested in what the RPC would want to bump to the front and really concentrate resources on. Staff agrees that we need to work on what we have and continue to make small improvements. Staff Woods further noted that not being prepared to receive the public art could be awkward and that we do have the resources to do some site specific plans but he is not suggesting that all the funds be used for that project. Spring of 2014 will be quickly upon us and a few months will be needed for site preparation. Staff Woods also noted that there are restrooms and play structures in need of replacement. Staff is looking for direction from the RPC on how to specifically concentrate resources.

Commissioner Coxwell inquired if we are committed to prepare a site for the sculpture. Staff Woods responded that the site has been dedicated to the sculpture and staff has determined that a minimal amount of preparation is necessary. Some of the preparation would include vehicle and pedestrian improvements. He further noted that any improvements made to the site can be incorporated into any future master planning of the area.

MOTION: Commissioner Coxwell moved that staff put preparing the site to receive the Fisherman's Family Sculpture on the Work Program as well as making improvements to Del Mar Park restrooms and parking lot a high priority on the Work Program. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Croley.

Commissioner Swain asked if the funds to be used to prepare the sculpture site would be general funds. Staff Woods responded that it would be Park-In-Lieu fees that would be used not general funds.

Commissioner Croley stated that we are committed to receive the sculpture but are trying to prioritize between bathrooms and play structures and it's not clear how to move forward.

Staff Woods stated that the fact that the sculpture is not on the Work Program does not mean it can't be funded. Not having the NWIP master plan move forward using Park-In-Lieu fees at the Council level does not eliminate the need to improve the site to receive the sculpture. If it is not a priority for the RPC to make the necessary site improvements then the sculpture will have to be stored in an off-site area until funds are secured.

Commissioner Sidaris recommended making minimal improvements to the site in order to prepare for the sculpture and eventually incorporate further improvements into the master plan.

Commissioner Croley stated that we should not make the improvements unless we can do the entire project. We should wait until enough funds are available to do the entire project.

Staff Woods has a tentative meeting with the design team coming up soon and they will be addressing potentially scaling back the improvements for the sculpture area in an effort to prepare to receive the art.

Commissioner Swain recommended that the design be developed in a way that it can be implemented in stages so that the sculpture can be received and placed on the site.

Staff Woods summarized what he understood to be RPC's direction: make replacing the restroom and resurfacing the parking lot at Del Mar Park a priority on the Work Program for 2014-15 and allocate some of the Park-In-Lieu fees for preparing the site at Target Rock to receive the sculpture.

MOTION: Commissioner Croley withdrew her second of the motion. Seconded by Commissioner Swain and carried. (5-1 Croley)

D. NEW BUSINESS

D-1 PROGRAM EVALUATIONS

Staff Sweeny gave a summary of program evaluations for Boys Middle School Volleyball, Middle School Track and Field, Spring Adult Softball, Rock to Pier Run and Labor Day Tournament. Staff Sweeny noted that we are now including the indirect revenue of the value of volunteer hours in our program evaluations. This volunteer value rate is based on the national group The Independent Sector Value Volunteers' 2012 rate of \$22.14 per hour.

Motion: Vice Chair Sidaris moved to accept the program evaluations for file. Seconded by Commissioner Romero and carried. (6-0)

D-2 INITIAL REVIEW OF PROPOSED INTEGRATED PEST MANAGEMENT POLICY

Staff Woods stated that this item is brought to the RPC by direction of the City Council. Staff Woods asked to break protocol to mention there was a member of the public present earlier, Marge Leggerton (leader of the community group Save Our Squirrels) that thought she could speak on this item as public comment when the item came up, as it is done at City Council meetings. She was informed that the current format for RPC meetings is to have public comment at the beginning of the meeting only. Staff will be looking into adjusting the RPC meeting format to be consistent with City Council meetings if the Council so desires. Staff Woods shared the following comments from Ms. Leggerton:

- Mr. Woods is trying to make a good faith attempt to give the City a policy for direction it currently doesn't have.
- The template chosen needs to be molded to fit Morro Bay
- This policy discussion is before the RPC tonight because the City put out poison in parks to kill squirrels. Based on this policy proposal, the method used would not be allowed.
- The word "pests" is too broadly defined.
- A City policy needs to reflect our values, and how those values will be encompassed in objectives and an action plan.
- Members from Save Our Squirrels (SOS) would be happy to serve on a sub-committee with members of the RPC to help craft an appropriate policy.

Staff Woods presented the staff report, noting that the City has provided pest management for years, but has not enacted a formal policy. Such a policy enhances the City's ability to respond to public concerns. Staff Woods also noted that City staff does not apply pesticides, only herbicides on a limited basis. The City utilizes outside companies for the application of pesticides. Staff Woods also stated that the development of an Integrated Pest Management policy (IPM) will provide the structure and the protocol to ensure consistent response to pest situations. Staff Woods emphasized the importance of input from community groups and residents in the implementation of an IPM.

Vice Chair Sidaris stated that he has been contacted by some Morro Bay residents with their concerns about pest management. He believes the plan is comprehensive but is in favor of creating a subcommittee that includes the public. He would like to make sure staff supervises the application of any pesticides.

Commissioner Swain would like to meet with the SOS group to enlist their help in educating the public on not feeding wildlife, perhaps requesting help from the group with the purchase of additional or larger signage.

MOTION: Commissioner Swain moved to accept the proposed Integrated Pest Management Policy as presented. Seconded by Commissioner Romero and carried. (6-0)

Staff Woods stated that there had been some talk tonight about bringing in some public input in the development of this policy although that direction was not included in the motion. Staff would still like to meet with representatives from the SOS group and is looking for a Commissioner to participate in that meeting. Vice Chair Sidaris stated that he would be willing to work with staff and the SOS group.

D-3 REVIEW 2014 MEETING CALENDAR

Staff Woods presented a staff report outlining a proposed meeting schedule for 2014. Staff Woods recommended inviting an Adopt-A-Park group to each future meeting in order to spotlight their work at their adopted park and to recognize their volunteer efforts. In addition to the Commission's 6 regular meetings, staff is recommending two additional special meetings.

MOTION: Commissioner Coxwell moved to adopt the proposed meeting schedule including the two special meetings with dates to be determined. Seconded by Vice Chair Sidaris and carried. (6-0)

E. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Commissioner Croley asked that staff look into additional use of Del Mar Elementary School for youth programs.

Commissioner Swain asked that staff look into the Honor Heroes Banner Program used in other cities. He stated that such banners feature a picture of a person serving in the military and that all fees are paid by the family of the featured military personnel.

Commissioner Swain also asked that staff bring Pickleball back to the RPC for discussion.

F. ADJOURNMENT

Meeting adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

Dear Mayor Irons and Council,
San Luis Obispo Council of Governments has called for a current list of Unmet Bicycle and Pedestrian Needs to be presented at their meeting February 5, 2014. Morro Bay Citizens Bike Committee submits the following list for consideration.

1. Address tree root encroachment underneath the Class I multi-use trail from Main Street to the Cloisters. Particular damage is occurring between the high school driveway and Coral Street. Existing pavement is buckling and cracking and will eventually become unsuitable for bike travel. We are rapidly losing a major investment in an enormously popular walking and bicycling path that connects north and south Morro Bay.
2. Re-engineer the intersection of Quintana with Main Street in Morro Bay to provide safe crossing for northbound cyclists from Main to the bike trail.
3. Replace fixed metal bollards that are placed in the center of Class I bike paths with flexible delineator posts (see examples below).
4. Provide more bike parking facilities at popular destinations. We would like the City to explore the idea that bike parking does not belong on sidewalks, that sidewalks are for pedestrians and that there are innovative alternatives such as bike corrals.
5. Paint Class II bike lanes on Atascadero Road from Morro Creek to the high school to connect to existing Class II and Class I bikeways.
6. Designate Safe Routes to School thoroughfares north and south of Del Mar Elementary School.
7. Plan safety improvements to the Main Street/Radcliffe intersection in anticipation of the bike park installation.
8. Raise the Class I multi-use trail beside PG&E property above the flood line.
9. Widen Toro Creek Bridge across Highway 1 north of Morro Bay to add a bike lane on the northbound side.
10. Extend the Harborwalk south along the Embarcadero through Tideland Park to Morro Bay State Park and through the park to South Bay Boulevard.

11. Extend the Harborwalk north from Morro Creek to the south end of the Morro Bay-Cayucos Connector.
12. Refresh bike lane painting as needed throughout the city.

We thank Council and SLOCOG for supporting and installing many important new bike facilities this past year, including an extension of the Harborwalk across Morro Creek, installing bike lanes on San Jacinto from Main Street to Ironwood, installing crosswalks on Atascadero Road near the high school to connect the north-south bike path, designating Beachcomber and Sandalwood as a Class III bikeway and developing a City Bike Map.

Staff is working with Project Surf Camp and Cal Poly to present the first winter camp. The camp is scheduled for February 22, 2014 at Coleman Park. The program will be very similar to the summer camps with the difference being the time of year and the official participation of Cal Poly students as a class project.

Annual Dixon's Spaghetti Dinner

The 25th Annual Dixon's Spaghetti Dinner will be held on Friday, March 14, 2014 at the Morro Bay Community Center. This dinner is a fundraiser for the Morro Bay Community Foundation's Youth Scholarship Fund. Volunteers and donations are needed to make the event a success.

City Website/Recreation and Parks Pages

Staff continues to add content and update the webpages as needed, and recently added a Middle School Sport Leagues page dedicated to competitive and intramural LOMS sports.

Morro Bay Senior Citizens, Inc.

The Morro Bay Senior Citizens, Inc. will no longer operate a utilities/bill payment center. Recent changes in tax laws would require the MBSCI to employ an individual to perform the bill payment center closing duties each evening. The MBSCI bylaws clearly state that the non-profit MBSCI organization shall not have employees and coupled with the expense of payroll (which is greater than any profits the MBSCI may receive from the bill payment center), at the December 13th Board of Directors Meeting it was unanimously voted to discontinue processing utility payments as of the end of the 2013 tax year. Fortunately, Perry's Parcel and Gift at 785 Quintana (next to Urgent Care) is the new Morro Bay bill payment center.

Recreational Classes

Recreational Classes resumed in January after a short winter break. Staff is currently working to develop additional classes in the near future. Currently, Staff has expanded the Tennis Lessons opportunities by adding a Tiny-Tots class to begin in early February.

Street Maintenance

The Maintenance Division of the Recreation and Parks Department is responsible for responding to minor street repairs such as potholes, cracks, and other hazards related to public right of ways. Major street rehabilitation projects are processed by the City's Engineering Division within the Public Services Department based on priorities established by the City's Pavement Management Plan (PMP). City's Street division continues to patch the most critical potholes that they identify during their routine field checks or as reported by the public. The City's Street division will also be overseeing the replacement of previously removed concrete sidewalks in and around the business district.

Estero Bay Youth Soccer

All-Star teams participated in two tournaments in December—Orcutt Classic Cup and the South Bay Shootout. The teams performed well at both tournaments.

Adult Softball Spring Leagues

Registration for the Spring 2014 Adult Softball League will begin January 27. The season is expected to begin late March.

Estero Bay Youth Basketball League

Games for the Estero Bay Youth Basketball League began on January 10 and 11. The season will continue through March 8. We have 29 teams of boys and girls in grades 3rd through 8th grade. Due to increase facility use by the schools games will be held at MBHS, Cayucos, LOMS, Del Mar and Baywood depending on the week. Game schedules are posted online at www.leaguelineup.com/mbsports. Sportsmanship is the focus of the league this year and we will be awarded points to teams, coaches and spectators this season with the teams with the most points at the end of the season earning an award.

Los Osos Middle School Boys Volleyball

Try-outs for the Middle School Boys Volleyball program will be held February 11, 12, 13. It is expected to form two teams. Games have been scheduled with Laguna, St. Patrick's, Mesa, Old Mission School and hopefully with Cayucos (starting a program this year). Volunteer coaches are being sought for the teams. Interested parties should contact the Morro Bay Recreation and Parks Department.

Los Osos Middle School Track and Field

Track and Field will begin in March. Events offered will be dependent on our volunteer coaches. Throwing events and running events currently have coaches. We are looking for a hurdles coach and high jump/long jump coach.

Coast Girls Softball

Registration is open through January 31 for the 2014 Coast Girls Softball League. Assessments will be held on Feb 1 at Lila Keiser Park. This league is open to girls ages 5-18. The season will begin on March 15 with opening ceremonies and Pitch Hit and Run contest at Lila Keiser Park.

Kids' Club Children's Center

Kids' Club Children's Center is a licensed before and after school enrichment program for students in K through 5th grades. Kids' Club is open every day school is in session. Kids' Club enrollees have the opportunity to participate in a wide-variety of activities that enhance their social, emotional and cognitive skills. In addition to activities that enhance developmental skills, Kids' Club Leaders also provide homework assistance when needed. Currently, Kids' Club has full enrollment for the 2013/14 school year.

The 2013/14 school year brought Transitional Kindergarten (TK) to the Del Mar campus. Staff began a dialog with Community Care Licensing regarding the possibility of receiving an exemption

allowing for the care of children in TK at Kids' Club. This exemption would be needed because at the time Community Care Licensing did not recognize TK students as elementary students. Staff is pleased to report that because of this dialog, the State of California Community Care Licensing Division has adopted new guidelines regarding TK students and now considers TK students elementary students allowing for school-age centers to care for TK students without the need of an exemption. Although Kids' Club currently has a full enrollment, staff is excited to be able to offer care to TK students starting in the 2014/15 school year or if space becomes available this school year.

Rockies – The Morro Bay Teen Center and Skate Park

Rockies provides a safe and healthy alternative to local youth. During the school year, Rockies is open Mondays through Fridays from 3 to 7 p.m. and on Saturdays from 1 to 7 p.m. The Morro Bay Teen Center is open to all youth in grades 7th through 12th and the Morro Bay Skate Parks is open to all ages. The Skate Park has scheduled bike only days on Wednesdays during the school year. The Morro Bay Teen Center celebrates its 14th year of operation with a special late-night held on January 10th and more celebrations throughout the 2014.

Morro Bay Teen Action Club (TAC)

The TAC continues to fulfill their weekly duties through the Adopt-A-Park program at Lila Keiser Park. The TAC was on hand to assist with the Morro Bay 50th Celebration Dinner held on January 11th and looks forward to more volunteer opportunities during this year-long celebration. The TAC continues to actively seek community service opportunities with the City because it is part of their mission to “give back to the City” for providing teenagers a place to go after school.



Box Art Program: Thanks to the implementation of the Box Art Program, creative and colorful paintings now grace the once drab utility/traffic boxes that align downtown San Luis Obispo. Over the past several months, City staff have consulted with the Downtown Association to design a program that would use public art to augment the beautification efforts taking place in the downtown area. Mirrored after several other California cities, the Box Art Program was formed. A Call for Artists was released and a public art jury selected 16 conceptual renderings for painted utility/traffic boxes.



Just the weekend before Savor the Central Coast, the Box Art Festival took over downtown with 14 local artists transforming 16 old and unattractive utility/traffic control boxes into interesting pieces of art. Festival goers with Box Art Walking Tour Map in hand took off on foot to find the art boxes scattered around the downtown core. Approximately nine days after the festival, all 16 boxes were completed and sealed with a UV and anti-graffiti clear coat and 14 exhausted artists had some amusing stories to tell of their time painting on the streets.

The Box Art Program contributes to the vitality and attractiveness of downtown while deterring graffiti and giving local artists an opportunity to add personal touches to the City's public art collection. One artist comments "What a great opportunity and privilege to participate in the Box Art project. It is rare that people get to do what they love and connect with the community, and get paid for it. Thank you again SLO Parks and Recreation". To view the Box Art Walking Tour Map, visit www.slopublicart.com.

Haunted Jack House: On October 24th and October 31st, the Historic Jack House and Gardens were transformed into a *spooktacular* scene. Jack House docents led visitors by flashlight through the dimly lit 'Haunted House' while telling ghost stories and Jack family folk lore. The Victorian-era home was decorated with spider webs, creepy crawlies, bats and rats. Theater students from San Luis Obispo High School volunteered for the event and acted as ghosts. The old Jack House buggy was also brought out of the shed for display in the gardens. Over the two weekends, the Jack House had 267 visitors who enjoyed being both scared and informed about the Jack family and days gone by in San Luis Obispo.

The Work Program Document has also been important in the pursuit of grant funds in that it provides verification to the granting agency that the project or program is of interest in the City.

SUBJECT: Discussion of Offering Pickleball as a New Recreational Program

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the Recreation and Parks Commission (RPC) review the possibility of offering Pickleball as a new recreational program, and if favorable, provides staff with options for implementation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact will vary depending on the location and program provider. The least expensive option would be to restripe the courts at Monte Young and allow the public to use on a drop-in basis. Other venues will require additional resources such as the purchase of nets and possibly on-site storage with costs estimated at \$300 - \$800.

SUMMARY:


Pickleball is a sport which is experiencing an increase in popularity within San Luis Obispo County. Club activity has increased in Paso Robles, Atascadero and Cambria, with a special interest to provide the Pickleball experience here in Morro Bay. If offering Pickleball is desirable, and a location is determined, then staff would include the sport/facility in the Work Program 2014/15, and plan on providing resources for implementation.

BACKGROUND:

Pickleball is a sport played with a composite/graphite paddle and a baseball-sized waffle ball. Pickleball is very similar to tennis, but is played on a smaller court. The court is the same size as a badminton court; 20' wide x 44' long or one-third the size of a tennis court. The net is two inches lower than a tennis court net, and should be set at 34" at center. A Pickleball rule summary sheet is attached for review. A more detailed history of Pickleball, provided by the USA Pickleball Association is also attached. The sport began in 1965 and is currently growing fast here on the Central Coast, with organized programs in Paso Robles, Atascadero, and Cambria.

DISCUSSION:

The idea of providing the opportunity of Pickleball to the Morro Bay community was presented to the Recreation and Parks Commission at their regular meeting of November 19, 2013. During public comment, Dr. Kathryn Thomas expressed great interest in the recreational sport of Pickleball and the desire for the City’s support. She explained that Pickleball is being played in neighboring communities and in fact organized by Pickleball clubs and offered through city recreation departments.

Determining the location for a new Pickleball program could prove to be a significant challenge. Currently, the City does not offer Pickleball, and the most similar facility the City owns in which the sport could be offered would be the existing hard surface tennis courts at Monte Young Park. Restriping the courts would require material and labor to install. The options presented for discussion would include utilizing existing tennis courts, rehabilitation an existing facilities, and/or provide indoor opportunities at either City owned or leased properties.



Primary list of possible locations in which to offer Pickleball:

1. Existing Tennis Courts: Monte Young Park, Del Mar Park
2. Existing Properties which may be rehabilitated: Coleman Park Basketball court, Del Mar Roller Hockey court, City Park shuffle board court
3. Non-City owned leased facilities: Morro and Del Mar Elementary schools

As the physical requirement of a court is essential, the programming side of the sport would also need to be addressed.

CONCLUSION:

Pickleball is a sport which is experiencing an increase in popularity within the San Luis Obispo County. Club activity has increased in Paso Robles, Atascadero and Cambria, with a special interest to provide the Pickleball experience here in Morro Bay. If offering Pickleball is desirable, then a location will be extremely important to allow access for the public on either a free or fee basis. If Pickleball is desired and a location is determined, then staff would include the sport/facility in the Work Program 2014/15, and plan on providing resources for implementation.



USAPA.org Pickleball Rules Summary

Revised: November 1, 2007. *Note: This is an abbreviated form of the rules to give a quick overview of how the game is played. See the official rules at usapa.org/officialrules for more information. If there is a conflict between this summary and the official rules, the official rules prevail. .*

The serve must be hit underhand and each team must play their first shot off the bounce. After the ball has bounced once on each side, then both teams can either volley the ball in the air or play it off the bounce. This is called the "double bounce rule" because the ball must hit twice (once on each side) before it can be volleyed. This eliminates the serve and volley advantage and prolongs the rallies. To volley a ball means to hit it in the air without first letting it bounce.

The non-volley zone is the 7-foot zone on both sides of the net. No volleying is permitted within the non-volley zone. This rule prevents players from executing smashes from a position within the zone. When volleying the ball, the player may not step on or over the line. It is a fault if the player's momentum causes the player or anything the player is wearing or carrying to touch the non-volley zone. It is a fault even if the ball is declared dead before the player touches the zone. A player may be in the non-volley zone at any other time. The non-volley zone is sometimes referred to as the kitchen.

Both players on the serving team are allowed to serve, and a team shall score points only when serving. A game is played to eleven points and a team must win by two points. Rallies are lost by failing to return the ball in bounds to the opponent's court before the second bounce, stepping into the non-volley zone and volleying the ball, or by violating the double-bounce rule. The hand is considered an extension of the paddle. The player loses the rally if the ball hits any other part of his body or clothing.

The server must keep both feet behind the baseline during the serve with at least one foot on the court surface at the time the ball is struck.. The serve is made underhand. The paddle must contact the ball below the waist. The serve is made diagonally cross court and must clear the non-volley zone. The non-volley line is a short line for the serve (the serve is a fault if it hits the line). All other lines are good at all times. Only one serve attempt is allowed, except in the event of a let (the ball touches the net on the serve, and lands on the proper service court). Let serves are replayed. At the start of each new game, only one player on the first serving team is permitted to serve and fault before giving up the ball to the opponents. Thereafter both members of each team will serve and fault before the ball is turned over to the opposing team. When the receiving team wins the serve, the player in the right hand court will always serve first.

When the serving team wins a point, the server moves to the other side of the serving team's court. Note that if the serve rotation is done properly, the serving team's score will always be even when the player that started the game on the right side is on the right side and odd when that player is on the left side.

Singles Play: The server serves from the right side when his score is even and from the left side when his score is odd.

Rule exception: Games are usually won by two points. In some situations, event directors may choose to win by one to speed up play.

THE HISTORY OF PICKLEBALL

1965 – After playing golf one Saturday during the summer of 1965, Joel Pritchard, congressman from Washington State and Bill Bell, successful businessman, returned to Pritchard's home on Bainbridge Island, WA to find their families sitting around with nothing to do. The property had an old badminton court so Pritchard and Bell looked for some badminton equipment and could not find a full set of rackets. They improvised, cutting shafts of the damaged rackets and found a perforated plastic ball. The rackets didn't work very well, so the dads created four wood paddles, similar to today's wood paddles. At first they placed the net at badminton height of 60 inches and volleyed the ball over the net. As the weekend progressed, the players found that the ball bounced well on the asphalt surface and soon the net was lowered to 36 inches. The following weekend, Barney McCallum was introduced to the game at Pritchard's home. Soon, the three men created rules, relying heavily on badminton. They kept in mind the original purpose, which was to provide a game that the whole family could play together. The Pritchards had a cocker spaniel named Pickles, who became interested in this new game. Whenever a ball would come his way, he would take the ball and run off with it, because you see, it was Pickle's ball. And that is how the game got its name.

1967 – The first permanent pickleball court was constructed in Joel Pritchard's backyard in Seattle, Washington during the winter of 1967.

1972 – A corporation was formed to protect the creation of this new sport.

1975 – *The National Observer* published an article about pickleball followed by a 1976 article in *Tennis* magazine about "America's newest racquet sport."

1976 – During the spring of 1976, the first known pickleball tournament in the world was held at South Center Athletic Club in Tukwila, Washington. David Lester won Men's Singles and Steve Paranto placed second. Many of the participants were college tennis players who knew very little about pickleball. In fact, they practiced with large wood paddles and a softball sized whiffle ball.

1984 – USAPA "was organized to perpetuate the growth and advancement of pickleball on a national level." The first rulebook was published in March, 1984. The first Executive Director and President of USAPA was Sid Williams who served from 1984 to 1998. He was followed by Frank Candelario who kept things going until 2004.

1984 – The first composite paddle was made by Arlen Paranto, a Boeing Industrial Engineer. He used the fiberglass/nomex honeycomb panels that commercial airlines use for their floors and part of the airplane's structural system. Arlen made about 1,000 paddles from fiberglass/honeycomb core and graphite/honeycomb core materials until he sold the company to Frank Candelario.

1990 – By 1990, pickleball was being played in all 50 states.

1997 – Joel Pritchard passed away at age 72. Though he was Washington State's Lieutenant governor from 1988 to 1996, he is probably better known for his connection to the birth of pickleball.

2003 – There are 39 known places to play in North America listed on the Pickleball Stuff website. This represents 10

States, 3 Canadian Provinces and about 150 individual courts.

2003 – Pickleball was included for the first time in the Huntsman World Senior Games, held each year in St. George, Utah during October.

2005 – Mark Friedenbergs was named President of the new USAPA, a new corporation. He created a Board of Directors ...

2005 – Steve Wong (Past USAPA Webmaster) created the new, improved USAPA website that went live in March. Bill Booth took over as webmaster in May, 2006. Website activity continues to increase as the popularity of pickleball grows and the features of the website increase.

2005 – USAPA became a Non-Profit Corporation on July 1.

2008 – The Rules Committee, headed by Dennis Duey, published the *USA Pickleball Association Official Tournament Rulebook – Revision: May 1, 2008*.

2008 – Pickleball has been included for the first time in the National Senior Games Champion Festival to be held in Providence, Rhode Island September 4 – 7.

2008 - There are now 420 places to play in North American as listed on the USAPA website. This represents 43 States and 4 Canadian Provinces and about 1500 individual courts. This does not take into account those places that are adding courts or the many courts at private homes.

2009 - The first USAPA National Tournament for players of all ages was held in Buckeye, Arizona, November 2-8, 2009. The tournament drew almost 400 players from 26 states and several Canadian provinces.

Barney McCallum Interview

Summer of 1965. This 14 minute video with Barney was recorded December 3, 2009 at his home in Seattle WA. Barney is a wonderful fellow, eager to talk about the game and it's history. Joel Pritchard, who actually originated the idea, and Bill Bell are no longer with us.
